Cover photos:

Upper right is an overview of the apex of the Chancellorsville battlefield, the intersection of the Orange Turnpike and the Orange Plank Road, with the Chancellorsville Tavern. To the right in this image, on the Turnpike, is the Dowdall Tavern (XI Corps HQ), where the stoutest resistance to Jackson's attack would be made at the 'Bushbeck Line.' As reported by Confederate BG Robert E. Rodes, "For a few moments they held this position, but once more my gallant troops dashed at them with a wild shout, and, firing a hasty volley, they continued their headlong flight."

Left shows the exquisite double equestrian statue of the last meeting of Generals Lee and Jackson. It was designed by Laura Gardin Fraser, the first of its type in the U.S. and erected in Baltimore in 1948. It was removed in 2017 and placed in storage.

At lower right is how Fredericksburg appeared to General Hooker as the Army of the Potomac approached the city in December of 1862. The city was bombarded by 150 Federal cannon, as troops rowed to establish a beachhead on the opposite bank of the Rappahannock River, to drive out snipers harassing engineers deploying a series of pontoon bridges. After crossing the river on December 13th, General Burnside's repeated but futile frontal assaults against the Sunken Road and in the Slaughter Pen did not dislodge the Confederates.

74th Annual Meeting Fredericksburg, Virginia

Greetings to each member of the Company of Military Historians attending this historic annual meeting on the 160th anniversary of two major Civil War battles in the Fredericksburg area. The Battle of Fredericksburg was fought on 13-15 December 1862 and the Battle of Chancellorsville just five months later, 2-3 May 1863. That is why this CMH annual meeting venue was chosen for 2023. In addition, the Fredericksburg area is very historic from the earliest Colonial times through the Revolutionary War to the Civil War, replete with many interesting places to visit.

We are pleased to have the meeting at a conference hotel in Stafford 20 minutes from Fredericksburg that gave us a fantastic room rate and provided meeting facilities. However, we had to find our own caterer for our meals, and were successful, so all meals are provided on site. Most of the volunteers for the meeting are Chesapeake Chapter Members of the CMH. We worked very diligently to keep costs down and I think we succeeded. If you need assistance, the yellow ribbons on the awards bar of the registration tags identify the volunteers. We are extremely lucky to have a great working relationship with the US National Park Service, who are assisting us in battlefield interpretation for the Friday bus tours. And we are also extremely lucky to have the A. Smith Bowman Bourbon Distillery in Fredericksburg provide a place for our Friday lunch, plus distillery tours and, probably unique to our meetings, bourbon tastings!

Our presentations include a mix of Revolutionary War and Civil War material culture topics that should interest everyone. 1730-1830 Presentation No. 1: Joseph W. Stahl and Matthew Borders Faces of Union Soldiers at Fredericksburg

Joe Stahl has been a prolific author of numerous articles and books on topics related to the enlisted soldier of the Civil War. He is also involved with battlefield education and preservation. This topic is a follow on to the well-received Faces of Union Soldiers at Antietam. He is a member of the Company and SHAF (Save Historic Antietam Foundation).

Matthew Borders has worked for the NPS at the American Battlefield Protection Program and currently at Monocacy Battlefield. He is a certified guide for Antietam, and received SHAF's 'Dr. Joseph Harsh Award' for research. Matt and co-author Joe Stahl have published the Faces series, including Faces of Union Soldiers at Fredericksburg.

0800-0900 Presentation No. 2: Donald C. Hakenson, Chuck Mauro The Emergence of John S. Mosby as a Strategic Tactician

Having published extensively on Colonel Mosby and his men, and conducted tours for many years over the Fairfax County, VA countryside that they covered, **Don Hakenson** is an acknowledged authority on the subject. He has received numerous awards for his commitment to preserving their story, and is a past president of the Stuart-Mosby Historical Society. He has ancestors who served in the cavalry of the ANV, including several who rode with Mosby's Rangers.

Chuck Mauro has also been deeply involved with Mosby's story, having co-produced and directed the documentary Mosby's Combat Operations in Fairfax County, Va. He has also published extensively on the subject, and received a lifetime achievement award "for his prolific body of work documenting the history of Fairfax County." Individually and together, Don and Chuck have published a number of tour guides on Mosby's combat operations in Northern Virginia.

0930-1030 Presentation No. 3: Craig D. Bell Pistols of Rappahannock Forge

Craig Bell has long been recognized internationally as both a foremost tax attorney and tax litigator, as well as an advanced collector of weapons and accoutrements of the American Revolution, War of 1812, Civil War, as well as 16th & 17th Scottish and European Arms and Armor. Craig served 27 years in the U.S. Army (active and reserve), is a past president of the American Society of Arms Collectors (ASAC) and current president of the ASAC Foundation, and vice president of the Kentucky Rifle Association. Craig is also a member of the NRA Gun Collectors Committee and chair of its National Treasure Weapons subcommittee. He currently serves as president of the Company.

1100-1200 Presentation No. 4: James L. Kochan Black and Whites in Redcoats: Colonial and Royal Marines in the 1814 Chesapeake Campaign

James L. Kochan spent nearly 16 years as a museum director and curator, principally with the Army Museum System and the National Park Service, before forming James Kochan Fine Art & Antiques. Pofessional honors and awards include the Anne S. K. Brown Military History Fellowship at Brown University. Jim is a Fellow and Life Member of the Company and has served as Assoc. Editor of MUIA. The author of 8 books and numerous articles on military material culture and history, he has also served as senior historical advisor for films such as Master and Commander: The Far Side of the World and A&E Television's *The American Revolution*.

1300-1400 Presentation No. 5: Charles H. Cureton, Ph.D. The Old Old Corps: Marine Dress, 1826-1839

Charles Cureton was in government service for 42 years, including 28 years of active and reserve duty in the USMC. He was deployed to the Middle East in 1990 as a field historian, documenting Marine operations through the First Gulf War. He has also served as Chief, Museum and Historical Property, Army Museum System, and Acting Chief Curator, TRADOC, overseeing 60 Army museums worldwide. Charles also participated in the development of the National Army Museum, which opened in 2020. He is a Fellow of the Company, and currently serves on its Board of Governors.

1430-1530 Presentation No. 6: E. Philip Schreier III The Pattern 1853 Enfield in Confederate Service

Phil Schreier has served the NRA for 33 years, currently as Director of the NRA Museums, and has been its 'face' on numerous TV and Internet presentations, as well as innumerable public appearances. He was instrumental in creating the National Firearms Museum at the relocated NRA HQ in Fairfax, VA. He has written hundreds of articles for periodicals like Man at Arms, American Rifleman, Military History Illustrated, as well as MC&H. An avid arms collector, Phil is a member of the ASAC and the Company.

1600-1700 Presentation No. 7: Patrick M. Gloyd The Federal Regulation Horse Equipment for Cavalry During the Civil War; "Bit by Bit"

Patrick Gloyd has been a student of American material culture for forty years, with a focus on, and publications about, military horse equipment of the Civil War era. He has been a governor and treasurer of the Company, co-chair of the 2016 annual meeting and president of the Chesapeake Chapter.

CMH 75th Annual Meeting in Midcoast Maine 2-5 May 2024

We are pleased to announce that the 75th Annual Meeting of the Company of Military Historians will be held in the historic shipbuilding town of Bath, Maine. The conference seminars, exhibits/flea market, and annual banquet will be located in the superb conference wing of the Maine Maritime Museum. Lodging is at the downtown Hampton Inn, where we have a block of rooms and hospitality suite reserved at this new waterfront hotel, within a few minutes' walk of restaurants,

pubs and shops. This is the first time that the Company has ever had a meeting in Maine and it should not be missed. Following a cocktail reception at the museum on Thursday evening and the formal program of talks on Friday, we will explore 17th-20th century sites and collections associated with this state's rich military and naval history on Saturday's bus tour. These will include Fort Edgecomb (the best-preserved, unaltered 2nd period coastal fort surviving in the US), the 17th and 18th century fort ruins and lighthouse at Pemaquid Point, the Penobscot Maritime Museum, the Civil War collections of the Joshua Chamberlain museum and much more. Following the banquet on Saturday evening, members will have the opportunity to participate in a Sunday morning cruise of the Kennebec River, which will include viewing "stealth" cruisers or destroyers at the Bath Iron Works under construction or in harbor for a refit, followed by tours of the museum campus. So mark your calendar and book your room reservations as soon as you receive your registration packet next year. This meeting will be great opportunity to renew old friendships and create new ones, while exploring the history and scenic beauty of Midcoast Maine and sampling the food, drink and hospitality of the region.
