## 2023 CMH Meeting Synopsis of Meeting, Fredericksburg, VA

## The 74th Annual CMH Meeting

A heritage-filled annual meeting of the Company was held at The Hampton Inn in Fredericksburg, VA, 27-30 April 2023. Committee Chairman John Thillmann was supported by a dozen volunteers from the Chesapeake Chapter. Several individual and corporate sponsors enabled receptions, event refreshments, battlefield tours, and even lunch and tasting at A. Bowman Distillery, during the meeting. Gathering began on Thursday with a welcome reception, followed by Chapter meetings with VP of Administration, Alejandro de Quesada, and a Board of Governors meeting. Although there was rain on Friday, bus tours of the Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville Battlefields continued with narration by NPS guides. A highlight was stopping at NPS Park HQ, Chatham Manor, an 18<sup>th</sup> plantation home across the Rappahannock River from the three spires of Fredericksburg, that served Federal commanders and as a field hospital. The tour continued on the Chancellorsville Battlefield with stops along Jackson's flank attack, and where he was mortally wounded. Returning to the hotel, Joe Stahl and Matt Borders presented "Faces of Union Soldiers at Fredericksburg," with engaging images and personal stories of participants. Dinner was provided by the Meeting Committee, as were all meals for the meeting. After dinner displays were up for examination and discussion, and wares for sale in the rooms for those purposes.

Saturday began with six presentations: Don Hakenson & Chuck Mauro began with "The Emergence of John S. Mosby as a Strategic Tactician," followed by Craig Bell discussing aspects of "Pistols of Rappahannock Forge," which included efforts to explore the original site of Hunter's operation. Two rare examples of his pistols were on display, along with several Hunter swords. Jim Kochan was recovering, so in his stead Alan Boyd presented "To the Victor – Spoils... The Battle of Lake Champlain and Plattsburgh". Charles Cureton then discussed the little known (and mercifully short-lived) green uniform of the USMC with "The Old Old Corps: Marine Dress, 1826-1839." Phil Schreier followed with an enlightening "The Pattern 1853 Enfield in Confederate Service," and the presentations were concluded with Pat Gloyd's instructive "The Federal Regulation Horse Equipment for Cavalry During the Civil War, 'Bit by Bit.'" The evening was concluded with a reception and dinner with President Bell presiding. After the pledge and traditional toasts (although the one to the King of England was new), new members were recognized, Chairman John Thillmann given thanks for a perfect meeting, and the plans for the 2024 meeting in Bath, ME were presented. By vote of members attending, the Miller Award for Best Display at an annual meeting was presented by President Bell to Fred Gaede for "Artifacts of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Seminole War, 1836-1842." There were no new Fellows nominated or elected, nor Founders or DSAs awarded. (Criteria for them can be found on the Company website).


