
We will start 2025 with a membership meeting on January 23rd. I hope to see you there! Cheers!

ALEXANDER HAMILTON'S PISTOLS


In January 2024 a pair of remarkable flintlock pocket pistols were sold by Christies at an auction in New York. The pistols were of such historical importance that the sale attracted a great deal of attention among historians and gun collectors. The matched set of pistols, which came out of the collection of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, belonged to one of the founding fathers and architects of the United States, Alexander Hamilton. These national treasures are one of only two known surviving pistol pairs that belonged to Hamilton.



Alexander Hamilton had a great and long-lasting impact on the shaping of the early United States. His remarkable life, from abandoned orphan on the Caribbean island of Nevis to leading roles as an officer in the Continental Army during the American Revolution, and as Secretary of the Treasury during George

Washington's Presidency, continues to captivate and inspire over two centuries later – so much so that there are even Broadway musicals about him.

Hamilton was an astute and intellectually brilliant administrator, politician, statesman, soldier and financier. His ideas are credited with laying the foundation for American government and finance. He served as an artillery officer in the American army, fighting in several battles, before he became one of George Washington's closest aides as well as a senior combat commander. He commanded three battalions under the Marquis de Lafavette during the Yorktown campaign. During the siege of Yorktown, he led his troops in a successful night-time bayonet assault on the British Redoubt No. 10. Capture of this redoubt, and Redoubt No. 9 by the French, convinced British General Lord Cornwallis to surrender, leading to the end of the war and American independence. After the Revolutionary War, Hamilton served as a delegate from New York to the Congress of the Confederation in Philadelphia. He returned to New York to practice law and founded the Bank of New York. Hamilton led the Annapolis Convention in 1786 to replace



the Articles of Confederation with the Constitution of the United States, which he helped ratify by writing 51 of the 85 installments of *The Federalist Papers*.



Hamilton served as the first U.S. Secretary of the Treasury in George Washington's cabinet where he envisioned a central government led by an energetic president, a strong national defense, and an industrial economy. He successfully argued that the implied powers of the Constitution provided the legal authority to fund the national debt and assume the states' debts. He created the First Bank of the United States. He persuaded Congress to establish the Revenue Cutter Service, the forerunner of the U.S. Coast Guard, and establish the United States Mint. He advocated in support of the Jay Treaty under which the U.S. resumed friendly trade relations with Britain. His views became the basis for the Federalist Party, which opposed the Democratic-Republican Party led by Thomas Jefferson. Hamilton and other Federalists supported the Haitian Revolution,

and Hamilton helped draft the constitution of Haiti. After he resigned as Secretary of the Treasury (to be with his ailing wife who had suffered a miscarriage) he fought for the abolition of the international slave

trade. During the Quasi War with France (1798-1800), President John Adams appointed him Major General in the army. When Jefferson and Aaron Burr tied for the presidency in the Electoral College during the election of 1800, despite philosophical differences with Thomas Jefferson, Hamilton endorsed Jefferson over Burr, whom he considered unprincipled and "a dangerous man, and one who ought not to be trusted with the reins of government." Jefferson won the Presidency after 35 ballots and Burr became Vice-President. When Burr ran for governor of New York in 1804, Hamilton again campaigned against him, arguing that he was unworthy. Taking offense, Burr challenged Hamilton to a duel and on July 11, 1804, in Weehawken, New Jersey, Burr shot Hamilton in the stomach. Hamilton died the next day in New York.

Made by one of France's leading gunmakers, Jean-Louis Jalabert, this small type of pistol is known as pocket pistols or pistolets du voyage because they were made for civilians to easily carry, one in each coat pocket. The maker's name, *Jalabert-Lamotte*, is engraved on the lock plates and the pistols can be dated to the six-year period between July 1798 and Hamilton's death in July 1804. Their maker, Jean-Louis Jalabert (1766-1846) was born in Saint-Etienne in southeastern France. St. Etienne had been a center for the production of weapons, including firearms, swords, and other edged weapons from the sixteenth century. Jalabert was taught gunsmithing by his father, Christophe Jalabert, a noted gunsmith, and later studied both the production of firearms and their decoration in Paris. Jalabert returned to Saint Etienne in the 1790s and married Marie-Anne Lamotte on July 27, 1798. Since she came from a well-established family of gunmakers with an established sales network, Jean-Louis thereafter signed his works with both of their last names, a not unusual practice in France. Jalabert-Lamotte specialized in hunting and luxury arms, like these pistols, and with his skilled training, technical inventions, and the sales network of the Lamotte family, he became one of the most significant arms makers of his time.



The .69 caliber flintlock pistols are both 9 1/16 (24.3cm) inches long with 4 ¾ inch (12.1cm) long barrels. They have walnut stocks and the grips are crisply checkered with steel mounts. The trigger guard front extensions are modeled in the form of a faceted vase, the steel pommel buttons are chiseled in the form of

a flower with gilt recesses. They have two-stage steel barrels, the breech halves are blued and faceted, and further chiseled, engraved, and inlaid in gold with vases issuing floral and leafy bouquets. The forward halves of the barrels are polished and have brass muzzle rings. The lock plates are engraved *Jalabert / Lamotte* and the underside of the trigger guards are engraved with Hamilton's initials, *A.H.*







The pistols were among Hamilton's most personal possessions and their provenance is well documented. Hamilton may have purchased the pistols or received them as a gift. According to a Christie's news release, "Their fine craftsmanship and French origins would have been of particular appeal to Hamilton, who appreciated artistic excellence and whose house, the Grange, featured a number of furnishings in the French taste." The Lamotte family of gunsmiths exported their wares internationally, particularly to Egypt, Morocco, Turkey, and America and living in New York City, Hamilton would have had ready access to imported goods. Another possibility is that the pistols were given to Hamilton by a friend or acquaintance from his previous military or political

life. Hamilton was a close personal friend of the Marquis de Lafayette and other French officers and notables from during his army and government service. His friendship with Lafayette, which was formed during the Revolutionary War, continued throughout their lives. In the early 1790s, Alexander and his wife Elizabeth actively supported French refugees from the terror of the French Revolution, and while

Secretary of the Treasury he enjoyed a close relationship with Charles-Maruice de Talleyrand-Périgord, the exiled diplomat and statesman who fled France after the execution of Louis XVI.

Hamilton had married Elizabeth Schuyler in 1780, the daughter of General Philip Schuyler, a member of a prominent New York family, and after his death Hamilton's pistols remained in the family. After Elizabeth's death in 1854 the pistols were bequeathed to Hamilton's grandson, Brigadier General Schuyler Hamilton (1822-1903). Then they were passed down to his grandson, Schuyler Van Cortlandt Hamilton (1882-1951), who sold them to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1950. The Met auctioned them at Christie's at their Important Americana auction on January 18-10, 2024, where these national treasures sold for \$819,000.



The only other known surviving pair of Alexander Hamilton's pistols, a matched pair of full-size .58 caliber horse pistols carried by him during the Revolutionary War and also bearing his initials **A.H.** were made in London by Nicholson. They were a gift from Major General Philip Schuyler (1733-1804), Hamilton's father-in-law. They were sold at auction by Rock Island Auctions on May 14, 2021, for a hammer price of \$1,150,000.

Guests and new members introduced themselves. There were 47 members and guests in attendance.

Those present were reminded to vote for the VGCA Member of the Year for 2024. This is the last opportunity to vote, and the winner will be announced at the January Membership Meeting.

It is time for Annual Members to renew. Membership Chairman George Dungan is out of town, but Bruce Buchner is available to take renewals.

Rob reviewed the upcoming presentation schedule (details on page 20). In addition to the scheduled presentation, the Trigger Time 4H Shooting Club will give an update to the VGCA at our January Membership Meeting.

Show Director Andrew Woodard noted that there are 30 tables available for rent at our spring Gun Show.

VGCA Visits Institute of Military Technology

At the end of October, a total of 22 VGCA members, family, and friends traveled south to Titusville, Florida. There they connected with Bernie Breighner, former VGCA President and current employee of Knight's Armament Company, who had graciously set up a tour of the Institute of Military Technology. It started on the evening of October 31st with an informal gathering at the Titusville Courtyard Marriott's rooftop Space Bar overlooking the Cape Canaveral Space Center (*below*, *with Bernie in the orange shirt at the back*). It was a fun evening with some adult beverages being consumed.





The next morning, the group (*below*) assembled in front of the Institute of Military Technology (IMT). IMT is the small arms (and some not-so-small arms) collection of Mr. C. Reed Knight, Jr. Started in 2009, IMT's mission is to Preserve, Educate, and Motivate by collecting and displaying historically significant items to help honor the history and evolution of arms and armed forces. IMT focuses on armament innovations as well as the technical and mechanical advancements, with an emphasis on those developments that took place in the United States. IMT is a private institution

and as such, not open to the public. Being able to see this incredible collection is by invitation only.



After signing in, we met IMT's Museum Curator, Joe Fink. Joe would be our tour guide for most of the day. Joe has what most of us would consider the perfect job. He said he spends one third of time cataloging artifacts (mostly firearms) for the museum, one third of his time conducting tours, and the final third perusing auction sites looking for future museum acquisitions. How great is that!?!

The tour began in the Hall of U.S. Arms (*below*). This huge room featured American small arms – and some crew serviced weapons – dating back to the Revolutionary War. There were military muskets,



rifles, shotguns, handguns, machine guns, cannons, prototypes, trials guns, and various production models. We spent almost the entire morning in this one area and at one point, Mr. Knight himself joined

us. A quick review of a collection of European cartridge conversions and early breechloaders (including Ferguson rifles from the Revolutionary War serial numbers 1 and 2!) in the Reception Hall and then we were off to lunch. Mr. Reed joined us at Sonny's BBQ, an apparent favorite of the Knights Armament folks. After some excellent barbeque, it was back to IMT!



The afternoon included the Hall of Modern Arms (*above*) with its recreation of Eugene Stoner's office / desk and early Armalite and Stoner 63 prototypes, the Culp Gallery (with Colt AR15 serial number 1 and the first Colt M16 made), and the International Hall of Arms. Mr. Knight (*on the left, in the maroon shirt*) shared innumerable stories of his friend Mr. Stoner. That experience alone was worth the trip!



In recognition of his efforts to preserve American military firearms history and for graciously allowing us to see it, Mr. Charles Reed Knight, Jr. was presented with an Honorary Membership in the Virginia Gun Collectors Association (*left*).

Unfortunately, for security purposes, we were unable to take many pictures inside the firearms portion of this

peerless collection. However, we finished our tour checking out the armored vehicles where pictures were allowed. I guess the risk of someone stealing a 35-ton M4 Sherman medium tank (*right*) is much lower!







One of Reed Knight's many ventures is that he has a McLaren sports/racing car dealership. It was an interesting juxtaposition to see these luxury lightning bolts parked next to armored fighting vehicles (above left) which themselves were designed for anything but speed (M7 Priest with 105mm cannon, above right)!

A hallway lined with muzzle-loading cannons connected the firearms collection to the tank park. VGCA Director Ian Wulf (*right*) was impressed!



We ended a busy day with a group dinner as our last official function. Many stuck around Titusville for the weekend, taking in the sights, checking out the local gun shops, and even trying to watch a SpaceX Falcon 9 launch (unfortunately postponed at the last minute by a helium issue). All-in-all, it was a fantastic VGCA trip!

VGCA's Second Field Trip in November – the National Museum of the Marine Corps

On Saturday, November 16th, members and family of the VGCA made their second field trip of the month, this one to the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Triangle, Virginia. It all started with 12 of us watching the film "We, the Marines" shown in the Medal of Honor Theater. Narrated by Academy Award-winning actor and Marine, Gene Hackman, the film follows the journey of Marines from boot camp to training, deployment, and finally homecoming and is well worth price (\$7 per person for a group of 10 or more – we had 12). After the movie, most of those attending posed for quick picture in the main hall (*below*) before starting our tour of the museum.



The tour was completely self-guided, and our members quickly split into two groups – those who took their time and those who REALLY took their time! I was in the latter group, and we didn't eat lunch at the museum's recreated Tun Tavern – inspired by the original Tun Tavern in Philadelphia where the Marine Corps was founded on November 10, 1775 – until almost 2 pm.

Before leaving the main hall, a dilapidated relic (*right*) caught my eye. It was a Bofors 75mm light field howitzer originally captured by the Japanese in the Dutch East Indies in early 1942. It was then one of six such howitzers sent to Guadalcanal in late 1942 to bombard the Marines at Henderson Field, before being captured by the Marines during a counterattack. Note the battle-damage in the recoil system below the barrel. This is just one of many such stories documented in this museum.

The story of the Marine Corps is one that revolves around combat, and the museum is organized chronologically to reflect the relevant wars, battles and weapons. Exhibits and associated dioramas reflect the actions, uniforms, and conditions experienced at the time. For example, the environment in the Korean War exhibit is cooled down to remind the museum guests of the brutal winter conditions experienced by Marines during that war.

VGCA members Marc Gorelick and Mike Hardesty (*right*) check out a Hotchkiss revolving cannon from the early 1900s. This hand-cranked brass and steel masterpiece consists of five 37mm barrels and had a rate of fire of 43 rounds per minutes.

The Viet Nam exhibit included a Marine armed with an M79 "Thumper" (below). The M79 was a single-shot 40mm grenade launcher That would eventually be replaced by an M203 grenade launcher mounted on an M16. Behind the Marine manequine is an M50 "Ontos" armored vehicle. Developed in the 1950s as a light, easily deployed anti-tank vehicle, it was armed with six 106mm recoilless rifles and a .30 caliber Browning machinegun. It saw



service in Viet Nam before being retired in 1969. "Ontos" means "the thing" in Greek!



This Soviet 122mm field gun (*right*) was captured on February 20, 1969 by Company C, 1st Battalion, 9th Marines. It is the largest artillery piece captured during Viet Nam and was one of twelve captured or destroyed during Operation Dewey Canyon.





This display of U.S. M16s and Eastern Bloc AK family of small arms of the Cold War (*above*) was a "crowd pleaser." Included was the M110 Semi-Automatic Sniper System (SASS) chambered in 7.62x51 NATO (*center top*) and the Soviet Dragunov SVD in 7.62x54R (*center bottom*).



The M198 155mm howitzer (left) being checked out by members Dan Helm and Mike Hardesty - has a range of 19 miles. It was developed in 1982 to replace WWII-era artillery for the USMC. This particular example, nicknamed "Damn Yankees" by its crew of Battery F, 2nd Battalion, 12th Marines, fired the first U.S. shot of Operation Desert Storm. This occurred on Jan. 21, 1991, during the Battle of Khafji on the border between Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. "Damn Yankees" was retired in 2009 and replaced by the M777.



Shown here is a Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected (MRAP) All-Terrain Vehicle (M-ATV) (left). Intended to replace M1114 HMMWVs (Humvee), it was designed to provide the same levels of protection as the larger and heavier previous MRAPs, but with improved mobility to handle the poor roads and difficult terrain of Afghanistan. This M-ATV still has the battle damage from when it hit an improvised explosive device (IED) while delivering supplies in Helmand Province, Afghanistan.

A display of the weapons from the Global War on Terrorism (right) included some unusual examples. Note the **British** Martini-Henry rifle dating from the 1880s in the upper right.



This F/A-18 Hornet and some of its associated ordnance (*at right*) was an impressive sight, filling an entire room!





The Amphibious Assault
Vehicle (AAV) symbolizes the
Marine Corps core mission. A
direct descendent of the WWIIera Landing Vehicle, Tracked
(LVT), the AAV has been in
service since the 1970s.
Equally at home on land or in
the sea, the AAV can carry up
to 5 tons of troops and
equipment and has seen
numerous upgrades to its
weapons and armor over the
years.

The National Museum of the Marine Corps may not get the attention it deserves because it is local and so accessible to most of us. That is a shame as its fairly recent expansion to include exhibits on the Cold War, Desert Storm, and the most recent conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan are well worth the visit. Admission is free and it is open every day except Thanksgiving and New Years. Plan to spend at least 3 to 4 hours if you go.

VGCA GUNS OF DISTINCTION:

COPY OF A PERCUSSION TARGET RIFLE

This unique high-quality piece is a modern replica of a 19th century European Schuetzen percussion target rifle. A Schuetzen is a type of rifle used in European long-range competitions. The word Schuetzen comes from the German word Schütze which can be translated as "shooter." The earliest usage was to denote units of marksmen or sharpshooters back in the days of muzzleloading firearms.



The .47 (12mm) caliber heavy octagonal barrel is 31.5 inches (80 cm) long. The barrel is browned and with diagonal stripes engraved in it, a countersunk muzzle, and with deep lead rifling. There is an adjustable rear sight with a brass cover on the barrel and a diopter rear sight.



The browned percussion lock would seem strange to American shooters with its backwards or counter directional hammer and blue tempered nipple shield. It has double triggers with a needle set trigger and the heavy brass trigger guard has finger grooves. The massive walnut full stock is heavily decorated with inlaid brass furniture and a heavy square brass buttplate. The barrel is held to the stock with two keys (wedge fasteners) and the walnut ramrod has a brass tip. There are three spare nipples in receptacles on the underside of the buttstock.



Presumably a one-of-a-kind, this striking hand-made muzzle loader was recently offered at auction by Joh. Springers Erben in Vienna, Austria with a starting price of 2,800 euros.

While this may be true in some cases, it needs to be remembered that there are elements within our society, regardless of SCOTUS decisions, the Constitution and a history of their control measures being fruitless, who will continue to attempt to deny or INFRINGE upon the Rights of the Citizens of this country.

Many of us were happy that a raft of anti-gun laws brought forward by one such organization in this State were vetoed by the Governor last year. Numerous experts said at the time that they were dead and buried. Scarcely a week into the New Year this same organization is advancing 17 such anti-gun bills in the Virginia Senate. Essentially, the same bills as last year with minor word changes. We can only hope that these bills will also be vetoed. If nothing else this proves that we need to be constantly vigilant and aware of what is happening in our environment. Complacency and the belief that all will be well in our world is severely misplaced and plays right into the hands of our adversaries. They will never stop while gun owners tend to regard a win as the end of the problem.

The potential for Concealed Carry reciprocity throughout the country, if signed, will be a significant step forward. With that said it will place a significant burden of responsibility for those CCW citizens wanting to avail themselves of this right. I doubt whether the passing of this as a National Law will be as simple as many people believe. States will still stipulate how CCW is conducted. Citizens will need to research the laws in each State (as you do now) but include all states you travel through. Any minor infringement in some states (and maybe Counties) could potentially land you in serious trouble.

The national numbers for CCW permits have dropped quite a bit in the last year or so. While this may be used by our adversaries as proof of their efforts, this is definitely not the case. The simple fact is 27 States now allow Constitutional Carry and the majority of citizens in these states see no need to spend money on a CCW Permit.

There is potential for SCOTUS to hear three firearms related cases in the upcoming future. If this does occur, there is hope that their findings (hopefully in support of) will be very clear and unambiguous in support of 2nd Amendment Rights. There is a degree of confidence that SCOTUS is becoming weary of their findings being ignored by lesser courts and States. We can only silently or loudly cheer if this is the case.

CMP SALES AND ORDERING INFORMATION CHANGES



The Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP) has changed its surplus rifle sales limits. Effective January 7, 2025, the CMP will allow CMP customers to purchase up to 12 surplus rifles of any type per calendar year. This limit does not include .22 caliber rifles. The CMP has also imposed a 2,000 round limit on the purchase of surplus ammunition. However, there is no limit on the purchase of commercial ammunition.

The CMP has further advised that it strictly enforces the limits referenced above. The CMP, at its discretion, reserves the right to ban from all future sales any attempts made by customers to circumvent these limits.

CMP 7.62mm NAVY VERSION M1 GARAND RIFLES STILL AVAILABLE



The CMP has advised that it still has US Navy M1 Garand 7.62mm Mod-o and Mk2 Mod-1 rifles available for sale. These rare collectible versions of the M1 Garand will only be available for purchase for a limited time. There are two versions of the U.S. Navy 7.62mm M1 Garand and this is a rare opportunity for U.S. martial arms and Garand collectors to get either, or both of them.

CMP Mod-o - 7.62 NATO version of the M1 Garand - \$900

These rifles were conversions of the M1 Garand to 7.62 NATO using a chamber bushing to convert the barrels from 30.06 Springfield. CMP categorizes these rifles as unserviceable due to the likelihood of "bushing ejection". These rifles are in stock and ready to ship.

CMP MK2Mod-1 - 7.62 NATO version of the M1 Garand - \$1200

The MK2MOD1 was a purpose built 7.62 NATO caliber rifle, built without the problematic "barrel bushing". The Mod1 has a 7.62 NATO chamber without the barrel bushing and is safe to use with 7.62 NATO ammunition. These rifles are in stock and ready to ship.

The CMP has reduced its price for Remington or Winchester .22 caliber surplus ammunition. It has dropped the price for a brick of 500 rounds 25%, from \$40 to \$30. Other deals include: .30 caliber carbine ammunition, 110 grain FMJ, 240 rounds in 10-round stripper clips in bandoleers for \$132; and Federal 12-gauge clay target shot shells, 2 3/4 inch, 250 round case for \$110 + shipping and handling. 
